EATING IN ISRAEL:

Breakfasts and dinners are kosher in our hotels. Lunches are on your own. Kosher options are available on route and in most multi-selection food courts.

Restaurants: Customary rate for tipping in Israeli restaurants and cafes – 20%.

Wait-staff tips must be left in cash; they cannot be added to a credit card bill. Almost every restaurant in Israel has menus in English. Occasionally, the spellings or translations can be a bit strange, but these can provide amusement as well as charm. Israelis generally eat later than Americans; usually becoming crowded around 9pm or later.

Ianguage allergy cards to carry at all times SNACKS - found in Israel may not have labels in English. Allergens might not be clearly marked. Bring your own from home.



WATER: Tap water is officially drinkable throughout Israel, but bottled mineral water is widely available. Remember to drink more liquid than usual to combat the effects of dehydration.

TAXIS:

Drivers must operate the meter for trips within the city. Locals do not tip taxis; the common practice is rounding the shekel amount up.

ELECTRICITY– European System 220V

To charge electronic devices in Israel you will need transformer and an assortment of adapters to fit Israeli outlets (available at Target, Amazon, Walmart). Most power sockets in Israel have three pinholes, but many of them will work with double-pin European plugs.

Please note that many newer devices– I Phones/ I Pads are compatible with the European system of 220V, however you still need adapters and USB cords to charge your devices. Shaver outlets in the bathrooms at our hotels are compatible with American shavers. Hair dryers are provided at the hotels.

The approximate cost per bag (plastic bag provided in hotel closets) 100nis (shekels) or \$30.00 per bag. Only Israeli shekels accepted – no credit cards. In addition, all the hotels offer valet laundry and dry-cleaning services but quite costly.

Please note that laundry service not available on 12 day sequence tours.

MONEY:

The Shekel is Israel's currency.

The rate of exchange fluctuates and approximately 3.1 - 3.2 shekels = \$1.00. We recommend that you bring **\$500.00 per person cash**, along with major credit cards. Upon arrival convert \$100.00 to shekels to be used for smaller items/incidentals.

ATM MACHINES:

ATMS are everywhere. Your debit card must be part of an international network; most are, but if you are not sure, ask your bank. ATM instructions begin in Hebrew and will automatically switch to English once you enter your card PIN number. If your PIN number is more than 4 digits, change it to 4 digits at your bank **before** you leave for Israel. ATMS only give shekels NOT American dollars \$.

BAGGAGE ALLOWANCE:

One suitcase & one carry-on bag per person.

Suitcases exceeding 50 pounds may be subject to airline fees upon check-in, and carry-on bags must be able to be stowed under the seat or in the overhead bin. Please review guidelines of the air carrier.

Porterage included on the tour for one suitcase only per person. Excess luggage will be subject to charges up to \$50.00 per piece.

Please note: Overhead space inside the bus is more restricted than on the airplane. The carry-on used for the plane may not be the bag for everyday needs and suggest that you bring a small carry-on for everyday use. Many pack this smaller bag in their suitcase.

LUGGAGE TAGS & NAME TAGS:

We will be mailing you 2 luggage tags and 1 name tag per person in final documents about one month prior to departure. Name Tags must be worn



during the tour for both security and identification at many of the sites in Israel. Place the luggage tags on your suitcase and carryon, prior to departure, and pack the name tags to be worn on the tour.

PASSPORTS:

You must have a passport that will remain valid throughout the trip and for an additional <u>six months post tour</u>. Every traveler (including children) must have his or her own passport. No visa or inoculations are required to visit Israel.

V.A.T:

Value Added Tax refunds are redeemed at Ben Gurion airport on departure from Israel only at VAT Counters. You must have the item purchased along with the VAT receipt to receive refund.
